LABOR DAY: HONORING THE AMERICAN WORKER

The end of the hot summer season is near – and what's a better way to step into the fall months than with a 3-day holiday weekend? In fact, an act signed into law in 1968 changed several holidays to be observed on a Monday to ensure federal employees could have more 3-day weekends, including Labor Day, falling on the first Monday in September. But what is Labor Day and why do we celebrate it?

In the late 1800s, during the peak of the Industrial Revolution, the average American worked 12 hours a day and 7 days a week to make a basic living. Individuals and families considered to be very poor or recent immigrants faced particularly horrible working conditions: limited access to fresh air, few resting breaks, and poor sanitary conditions. In some cases, children as young as 5 years old also worked in factories and mills. As a result, labor unions grew more prominent and began organizing strikes and protests (many turning violent) to vocalize needs for better working conditions, hours and compensation.

After years of battling between legislators and labor workers, several states began recognizing "workingmen's holiday" celebrated on the first Monday in September. In 1894, President Grover Cleveland signed Labor Day into law making it a federal holiday to pay tribute to the great achievements and contributions of American workers. It has since been celebrated with street parades, barbecues, and many other outdoor events. Labor Day weekend celebrations also symbolizes the end of summer and back-to-school season.
